

Through its published Vision, Mission, and Beliefs, JCSD1 acknowledges the individuality of the learning process and student well-being (JCSD1). In accordance with our Vision, Mission, and Beliefs, is recommended that New West High School require 20 credits for graduation that, in addition to the 13 credits required by the state of Wyoming, include:

- 1 credit physical education
- .5 credit personal finance
- .5 credit social-emotional learning
- .5 credit senior project (including work experience and/or employability skills)
- 4.5 additional credits

These requirements constitute a reconsideration of the requirements for high school graduation that acknowledges the increased challenges many of our students face; the requirements set forth by the state of Wyoming, the Hathaway Scholarship program, and the University of Wyoming; as well as our District's vision of our hopes for all of our students.

How Would This Initiative Impact New West High School?

 The way this and other information directly affecting NWHS has been poorly communicated is avoidable, disrespectful, and sows mistrust, undermining staff morale.

2. Decreased Core Instruction Time

$$8 \times 4 \text{ years} = 32 \text{ credits} (-4) = 28$$

$$7 \times 4 \text{ years} = 28 \text{ credits} (-4) = 24$$

$$6 \times 4 \text{ years} = 24 \text{ credits} (-4) = 20$$





A 7-period schedule would decrease instructional time across core courses by 24 hours per year at New West High School.

Even with a 4-day week (144 school days), the 6-period schedule provides about 13 more instructional hours per core course (i.e., math, English, social studies, science) across the school year than an 8-period schedule.

3. Decreased Schedule Flexibility



Requiring 4 more (elective) credits for graduation would decrease student options for internships, job-shadowing, and on-the-job training.

It would also decrease our ability to offer remediation. For example, we sometimes re-enroll students in math courses (e.g., Algebra 1) though they have a "D" (passing) grade on their transcript, when it's in their best interest...

...It would also impact our ability to respond to students' individual risk factors.

Every aspect of students' lives affects their ability to learn and succeed in school. These aspects are categorized as **student-related**, **family-related**, **school-related**, and **community-related factors**. While any one factor—or even several factors—does not necessarily prevent a student from being successful in a district's traditional high school program, these factors do identify the potential that a student may drop out (Frymier & Gansneder, 1989).

<u>This table</u> presents an extensive list of risk factors and New West High School's response to them.



To Summarize our Position...

- Families choose New West High School, not because of our credit requirements, but because we have designed an excellent alternative school designed specifically for JCSD1 students at risk of dropping out.
- The way this and other information directly affecting NWHS has been poorly communicated is avoidable, disrespectful, and sows mistrust, undermining staff morale.
- Increasing the number of credits required for graduation from NWHS isn't necessary; let's not decrease instructional time nor schedule flexibility.

On Other Topics:

Early Graduation: The language is too narrow—there are other unknowable reasons students might need to graduate early.

Early Release: We make decisions based on students' best interest.

PE Requirements: Since 2020, NWHS has required 1 credit of PE (which can include .5 credit of health). Our students travel to BHS for PE (Our thanks to Mr. Camino and Mr. Mader for taking care of our kids!).
